One of its duties is to create a fraternal bond between charters by incuting the spirit of brotherhood emorg them. It should strive to maintain at an equally high level the standards of character and conduct of all chapters.

But the question arises: How is the Grand Chapter going to go about accomplishing these things that are so vital to the life of the fraternity? The annual convention helps in some degree, but is far from enough. one solution lies in the publishing of a Triple X paper. The convention cannot be attended by every member; this is impossible. But every member will read the Triple-X paper. paper will be a medium in which matters of general concern can be discussed. Personal items of an informal nature will create interest in the paper, and at the same time will tend

There are certain factors in fraternity life that must be adhered to, not by force, but with the individual will. These basic factors are the foundation of any fraternity. In this issue I will discuss fellowship. First of all, let us define fellowship: fellowship may be defined as - association, communion, intimacy, society, joint interest or feeling. The reader will note that all these synonyms point to closer relationship of individuals. what intrinsic value is a fraternity without fellowship? Members must learn and should carry out principles of fellowship in their daily activities. Why do large organizations plan interorganizational contests, competition among the employees? Primarily for the benefit of the organization, but secondly, and most important, it creates fellowship by friendly competition. activates the mind, creates interest, does away with disharmony, promotes interest, and lastly, lightens the socalled drudgery of work.

Let us look back in history as far as possible and we will find those who were unsuccessful were so for certain definite reasons, mainly through satisfaction of their personal ego with no regard to anyone else. Caesar and Napoleon are good examples; they attempted attempted to conquer the world, but both met their finale in disgrace. Now let us look at a few who were successful or achieved fame, and who to the present day are idols of the public, -George Washington, Abraham Lincoln, and Theodore Roosevelt. These were men who realized the value of fellowship, and who practiced it every day of their l'ver until they recovered their reward. Our fraternity must and will exist forever so long as each successive generation adheres to those principles which the preceding generation sets forth.

We should not shirk from any obligations placed upon us; we should do our utmost to carry them out. It might take part of our time and maybe a little of our financial backing, but after all it is the result we're after, and that is what counts.

Each individual in the organization should feel the necessity of fellowship. Each should regard the other as an entity to that group which when working in harmony produces the most results. Each should respect the other but only on the same level. Do not overestimate yourself nor yet underestimate yourself. Give head to corrections if they are just, but always attempt to understand justness.

Every organization has its group of radicalists. This group is necessary to show the difference between the thoughts of different men. Try to educate this group, but do not use force in your attempt to explain your trend of thought. Try to find out the other man's point of view and by careful educational tactics you can put your thoughts over, but always remember, forceful methods as well as narrow-mindedness will defeat your purpose.

Remember the other fellow is also a human being. He has certain thoughts which he would like to express; let him do so. Get together often and figure things out systematically. Be careful about drawing your conclusions too suddenly. Reason out your ideas, and then arrive at some definite con-


Editor's Note

For the benefit of those appointed, as regards their duties reference is made to Article IX, Section 1 and Section 2, of the Grand Constitution.


In all probability the next Grand Chapter meeting will be postponed until later in the year.

Don't forget to square up chapter accounts with the Grand Treasurer in regard to head tax, etc. His address is P. O. Box 738, Fresno, California.




